To say that you are *responsible, creative or possess intellectual curiosity* is not enough. You must provide examples or anecdotes that support these personal or academic traits. This helps the reader gain insight into your true essence. Our task it to help the reader of the letter of recommendation distinguish you from other qualified applicants.

Also, all college/scholarship letters are confidential. Letters will not be given to students. Letters will be sent directly to the school or scholarship organization. Most letters will be requested online, but if one must be mailed the student should provide a stamped and addressed envelope.

It is recommended that you fill out this form digitally...it is more professional and easier to read. You will send a copy to each teacher, counselor, etc. from whom you request a recommendation letter. If you opt to submit a written version, keep the original and give copies.

Also, when requesting a letter of recommendation, please share the deadlines for the letter to be sent.
